

Declaration on the use of conflict minerals

Steckborn, May 1, 2014

Ladies and Gentlemen

Reports of human rights violations in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) regarding minerals mining, in particular tantalum (Ta), tungsten (W), tin (Sn), and gold (Au) have created worldwide public concern and unrest.

In July 2010, the United States Congress passed the “Dodd-Frank Wall Street Regulation and Consumer Protection Act” law, thus regulating the use of conflict minerals (tantalum, tungsten, tin, gold) from the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The legislation of Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Act requires U.S. exchange-listed companies to annually disclose to the SEC Securities and Exchange Commission, whether their products contain conflict minerals from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) or bordering countries.

Getronic Engineering AG complies with all national laws and regulations.
We also act accordingly to comply with Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Act.

Getronic products:

According to currently available information, we do not use conflict minerals from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) or its bordering countries in our own products (Getronic products). Of almost 100% of manufacturers and suppliers whose merchandise and special components we use, we have received a Conflict Minerals Reporting Template (CMRT) or an appropriate confirmation.

Customer products:

As a service provider for the manufacture of electronic systems (Electronics Manufacturing Services) manufacturers are usually defined by our customers or the materials (purchased or special components, etc.) are delivered to us. For customer products, we can assume no obligation regarding compliance with the Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Act. Should we identify critical manufacturers in this connection, we attempt together with our customer to find a common solution in compliance with the Dodd-Frank Act.
